

Why Do A Building Project?

The following was presented by Pastor Rich at our church conference on November 4th.

We are taking time this evening to broach the subject of our building and to what extent it meets the needs of our congregation and our mission. Anytime you consider a course of action, the best place to start is with Why. I am a "why" person. I think most of us are.

The What of our discussion is "do we need to do a building addition to meet the needs of our mission?" I believe the answer is yes. So let me get to the Why.

Community is important to us here at Hicks. You hear it in our mission statement – "Building communities of devoted followers of Jesus." Community is in our DNA. We see ourselves not just as a large gathering of individuals but as a gathering of people in relationship with each other in Christ. We are family. And so we Gather as a Family to worship, to learn, to listen, to pray, to serve. The church is the Gathered people of God. We are also the Sent. We are sent into the larger community as witnesses to Christ and His kingdom. This Gathered/Sent identity is a repeatable ebb and flow of our mission. We are living that out in our expression of community, or rather, communities. That's in our mission statement as well. We are building communities here at the building but we are also seeking to build communities away from our building. Prime examples of these are our ministries at Evergreen Manors, our Night of Worship at Coffee on Third, and community groups like Crux.

We have been creative and flexible with use of our building and ways that we can adapt to ministry away from the building. But there is a limit to how much flexibility and creativity can make up for building limitations. The building limitations are primarily one of space. [Continued pg. 2]

These needs were identified in a visioning process in 2017. The needs are still there. They are, in brief: need for another large group worship and multipurpose space; need for larger rooms for children and youth ministry. Adult classroom space; office space; and storage space.

The addition of these spaces would allow for several key improvements:

- Being able to go back to two main Sunday morning services without compromising room for growth.
- Separating the worship space from Sunday school space so that sound is no longer an issue.
- Separating Sunday School and worship times to encourage more adults to be in small groups on Sunday morning.
- Dedicated spaces for traditional worship and contemporary worship means less setup and more flexibility and creativity for those spaces.
- Our children's classrooms and youth rooms are near capacity on Sunday mornings. Additional space provides room for creativity and for growth.
- Being able to provide meeting space for more outside community groups (eg. YMCA before and after school, scouts, 12 step groups)
- Office space
- Storage space have you seen our closets, attic, and basements?

The last building project by this congregation that added indoor space was in 1916. Before that it was 1867. So the church went about fifty years between its initial building and the current building. We are now in year 108 since this building was built.

I do not believe in the "Build it and they will come" philosophy. That may be true for baseball fields in Iowa, but not churches. But I do believe that an inadequate facility can keep people from coming who might normally come. This is not meant to be a last word but rather a first word to initiate discussion and prayer around this matter. I welcome your feedback and input.

What does Scripture and theology say about God's mission and nature?

Missiologist Christopher Wright describes mission as God's great work in the world with purpose for goodness and restoration in creation. God's mission to redeem humanity stems from God's nature as a relational being; loving, merciful, compassionate, and gracious.[1] God calls the collective church to be in cooperation with God's purposes.[2] Wright's statement emphasizes that mission stems from God's will, not one's personal will.



God's mission seeks to set people free from the bondage of their sin and enter into eternal life. God in-

vites disciples to pursue holiness in cooperation with God's grace. God's nature is good and just, where God does not allow justice to go unseen or unheard.[3] Jesus came to set the captives free; to heal the wounded; to forgive our guilt and shame; and to bless the poor and the oppressed.[4] Jesus came to invite all those who would follow him into eternal life.[5] God's mission tasks the church to carry Jesus' message through word and proclamation of God's Kingdom as a present reality, begun in the ministry of Jesus, continued in the work of the Holy Spirit.

The Mission of God is restoration to right community between God, self, and others. God's nature is relational. In the fall of Adam and Eve, community between human and human, human and self, and human and God was first diminished, and as a result, humans struggle to maintain deep, genuine relations with one another as God intended. Throughout Scripture, God extends an opportunity to regain the community that was lost in the fall. God's mission is to be a presence in the lives of Israel that they would be transformed by God's gracious love for God's people. As time passes, two patterns emerge in the Israelite community: they are disobedient to the commandments, and God is merciful and forgiving. [Continued pg. 4]

Eventually, Israel's collective sin leads to an exile from their land. Israel is incapable of being a community that will bring redemption. God's people need a Savior.

God's mission is salvific. Salvation comes through Jesus alone, the anointed one who has been pronounced by the prophets of the Old Testament to save Israel. Jesus is God with us, bringing about a sense that God wishes to enter and engage in community with humanity.[6] Jesus restores the relationship and community between human and human, God and human, and human and self. Jesus is Savior in his life, death, resurrection, and ascension.


WOMEN IN FAITH
